Student Asthma Plans

Just a reminder to all families who have a student diagnosed with Asthma that it is necessary to provide an Asthma Management Plan completed by your GP every 12 months.

Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund applications

The Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund helps eligible families to cover the costs of school trips, camps, and sporting activities.

If you have a valid (as at the commencement of school on 30th January 2024) means-tested concession card, such as a Veterans Affairs Gold Card, Centrelink Health Care Card, or Pensioner Concession Card, or are a temporary foster parent, you may be eligible. There is also a special consideration category for asylum seeker and refugee families.

Payment amounts this year are \$150 for eligible primary school students. Payments are made direct to the school to use towards expenses relating to camps, excursions, and sporting activities for the benefit of your child.

If you would like to apply for the CSEF payment, please contact Janet on the school email address coldstream.ps@education.vic.gov.au to ask for an application form to be sent home. Check with the school office if you are unsure, and please return completed forms along with a copy of your card to the school office by February 17, 2023.

From the Department of Education

Dear parents and carers

There is at present an increase in community transmission of COVID-19 in Victoria.

You can help us keep your school as safe as possible by taking two important steps:

1. Ensure your COVID-19 vaccinations are up to date. Information on how and where to get vaccinated is available on the Get vaccinated webpage.

2. If your child shows symptoms of COVID-19, please ensure they stay home and get tested. The easiest way to test is to use a rapid antigen test (RAT).

Free RATs are available from your local council where you can collect 2 packs of 5 RATs and an extra 2 packs for each person in your household. People with disability and their carers can get 4 packs of 5 RATs. You are not required to have a Medicare card and you can collect RATs as many times as you need. You can also buy RATs at supermarkets, pharmacies, and other retailers.

If your child has symptoms but tests negative, please ensure they stay home until they no longer have symptoms.

If the RAT test result is positive, please ensure they say home for at least 5 days and until there are no more symptoms.

Thank you for your support – these steps will help us all stay well.

FUSSY EATERS - FOOD SCHOOL EXPLORE THERAPY MOOROOLBARK, 2024

What is Food School?

The Sequential Oral Sensory (SOS) Approach to Feeding at Explore Therapy is a program run by a trained Occupational Therapist focusing on intervention for <u>children with eating difficulties</u>. The SOS program aims to increase the range and types of foods a child will explore. The play-based program helps children to progress through the <u>Steps to Eating Hierarchy</u> from tolerating, touching, smelling, and eating new and non-preferred foods. Parent information sessions are incorporated into the SOS program to encourage the child's food exploration at home. Private and NDIS funded clients suitable.

Who is Food School for?

A child is suitable for the SOS Food School if:

- they have a decreased range of foods in their diet (they will only eat a few foods/drinks)
- they are reluctant to try new foods.
- they eat different foods to the rest of the family.
- mealtimes have become a stressful time for the child and parent/s or caregiver.

Ideally, a child:

- can copy actions in pretend play.
- can sit at the table for mealtimes.
- does not have food intolerances or severe food allergies (e.g. dairy free/nut allergy)
- is aged 3—10 years.

When does Food School run?

A 1:1 assessment is required to determine if the child is suitable for the food school program. The child is then allocated to weekly group Food School sessions on Tuesdays each school term in 2024.

- 2pm pre-schoolers
- 4:15 school aged children

COLDSTREAM PRIMARY SCHOOL UNIFORM POLICY

PURPOSE:

A uniform reinforces in students, pride in their own appearance, instils recognition of themselves as an integral part of the school community, and assists in developing pride in representing their school. Issues of equality, health and safety and expense are also factors that contribute to the establishment of the uniform.

SCOPE:

- To promote equality amongst all students.
- To further develop a sense of pride in, and identification, with our school.
- To provide durable clothing that is cost effective and practical for our school environment.
- To maintain and enhance the positive image of the school in the community.
- To be readily identifiable on excursions and sporting activities.

POLICY:

- School Council supports a policy of compulsory uniform. It is the expectation of the School Council that all students wear school uniform in the school colours of navy, sky blue and white, including the wearing of wide brimmed school hats as outlined in the Sunsmart Policy.
- Following consultation with the Junior School Council and the school community, School Council developed a uniform that provides choice for the students, allows for students to safely engage in the many varied school activities, and affords families value for money. A range of uniform options are available.
- The uniform applies during school hours, while travelling to and from school, and when students are on school excursions, unless specified.
- The Principal is responsible for the implementation of the uniform. Sanctions may apply for breaches of the uniform guidelines.
- Students are required to bring a note of explanation should they be out of uniform for any reason.
- Details of the student uniform items and places of purchase will be published in the school newsletter at the start of each year. A price list is available at the office. The cost of the uniform will be kept as low as possible.
- Summer and winter uniforms are available and should be worn to match climatic conditions.
- School socks, hair ties and headbands should be worn in school colours of navy, sky blue and white only.

- Scarves may be worn to and from school but not during recess and lunch play.
- Watches, Medical I.D., stud earrings and sleepers worn in the ears are the only acceptable jewellery. Students wearing any items other than those listed will be asked to remove them. This is in the interest of the student's safety.
- Unnatural hair colours, (eg: green, pink or purple rinses) are permissible only for special events such as sports days or dress up days. Extreme hairstyles, (eg: spikes or Mohawks) are strongly discouraged.
- To minimize the spread of head lice, students with long hair are required to have their hair tied back as a preventative measure. (Refer Head Lice Policy)
- Other than clear nail polish, cosmetics may not be worn at school. If there is a medical reason that some make up eg. Concealer needs to be worn; a letter of explanation, signed by a parent must be presented to the class teacher. Nails need to be of a functional length that will not risk injury to self or others.
- The only headwear that is acceptable shall be the school wide brimmed Sunsmart hats, consistent with our Sunsmart policy. They must be worn outside from September 1 to April 30. Navy blue beanies may be worn in winter, to and from school. Hats are not to be worn inside, except for extenuating circumstances or medical reasons.
- Students are required to wear supportive, well fitting shoes or runners at all times. Under no
 circumstances, including days of free dress, are open toe sandals or thongs to be worn. Slip on
 shoes are not considered suitable shoes for school. Shoes with rollers on the sole are
 considered to be unsafe at school. Students' shoes should be suitable for the activities
 undertaken on the day, eg. Runners are recommended on days of Physical Education.
- The Uniform shop will also offer second hand uniform as stock allows.
- Arrangements can be made to supply uniforms via State Schools Relief for families experiencing economic hardship.
- Parents seeking exemptions to the uniform due to religious beliefs, ethnic or cultural background, student disability, health condition or economic hardship must apply in writing to the School Council, through the Principal.
